The 2007 expected contribution levels by association and percentage are found in appendix 1

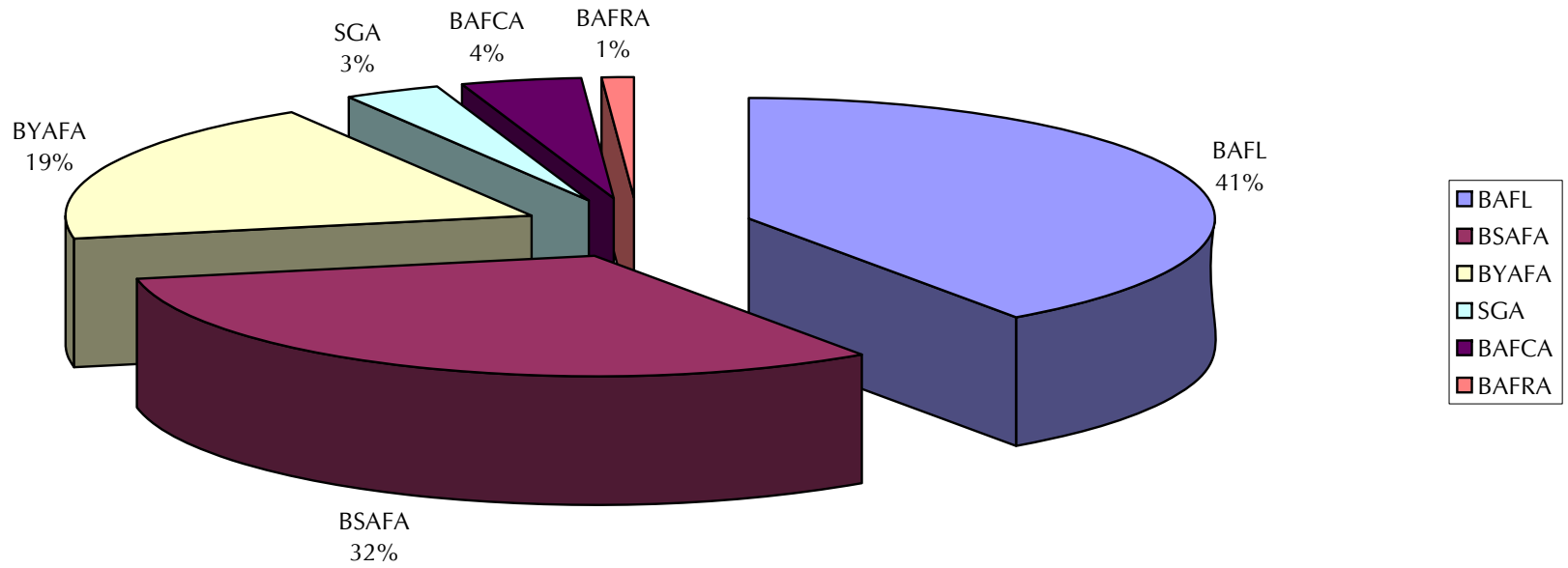
Where it is used
